With the provision of clean water as our core charity endeavour, this year not only did we scale up the existing projects, but also expanded our footprint to Myanmar, making clean water more accessible to people in need.

As regards the children development projects, our nutritious meal plan helped provide a balanced diet for hospitalized kids, as well as education courses on proper meal preparation for their parents. Meanwhile, with the completion of various school rebuild projects in Nepal and Myanmar, students will soon resume schooling.


In the 2nd year as the Ambassador of A Drop of Life, although I cannot visit water deficit countries in person, I am honored to join the goodie bags distribution this year.

In the last 20 years, we have tailored various sustainable water projects for water-stressed countries, ranging from water storage facilities to sanitation and hygiene programs. While stressing the importance on proper resource management, we also strive to increase water hygiene awareness of beneficiaries so that the blessing of clean water can last for generations.

Over 844 million people in the world live without clean water. Nearly 1 in 9 people are required to walk for at least 30 minutes to collect water.

¹Not only does it keep children out of school and take up time that women could use to earn more, the water collected often causes fatal waterborne diseases

Access to clean water is the first step towards a better livelihood.





Health

Over 842,000 deaths from diarrhea are caused by unsafe drinking water, sanitation and hand hygiene, among which 43% are children under five. Access to clean water and basic sanitation can save around 11,000 lives every week.²

Time

In rural areas, water collection is the duty of women and children. Access to clean water gives them more time to study, learn different skills and earn a living – a better chance to get out of poverty.





Education

More accessible clean water means more kids can go to school. Clean water and proper toilets also raise girls' school attendance by over 10%.³

Economy

Government's expenditure on medical services are expected to decrease as less people fall sick due to unclean water. When a community gets clean water, they can spend more time to engage in commercial activities and studying – which can significantly increase social productivity.

Life begins with water. With clean water, everything can be different.

Water Supply and Storage Facilities

With unique cause of water crisis in different countries, we tailor solutions for different areas in accordance with the local geographical factors, such as water source distribution, climate and weather.

1 Climatic Water Deficit Areas

Drylands of Northwest China experience water deficit due to scarce water source and high evaporation rate. To relieve the situation, we implement water storage facilities to gather as much water as possible during rainy season.

Projects: water cellar, water dam

2 Topological Water Deficit Areas

For countries with abundant water supply like Nepal and Cambodia, residents are still unable to obtain clean water due to financial constraints and poor urban planning. In such case, we help identify the water source and help build a water supply network to villages.

Projects: water well and pump, gravity flow water supply system







Water Purifying System





Besides water shortage, we have grave concern over drinking water safety. Water is of vital importance to survival, and at the same time a hotbed for waterborne bacteria. Contaminated water can cause many types of diarrheal diseases, including Cholera, Malaria and Diarrhea – all can be fatal in developing countries. Meanwhile, long-term exposure to water with heavy metals poses adverse health risks on children.

Our water purifying system can be implemented in different locations, with its design varies according to the ancillary facilities and actual demand of beneficiaries. For example, we use electricity-free biosand filter for schools and households in Cambodia, where electrical grids are not found. As for crowded schools and hospitals in Mainland China and Nepal where steady electricity supply is possible, we adopt nano filtration and reverse osmosis treatment filters to provide fast and steady supply of clean water. The drinking water is tested by third party to ensure its quality is of national drinking standard.





WASH Programme

To further enhance effectiveness of our projects, we do not stop at clean water provision. The sanitation facilities of schools at water shortage areas are often below satisfactory, with the hygiene education provided to students also inadequate. Girls in puberty often need to skip schools or even exams due to the lack of sufficient toilets.

The WASH programme we launch at schools focuses on 3 major areas to improve quality of water resources comprehensively. Not only do we hope to provide clean drinking water to students, but also cultivate their sense of hygiene awareness in long term.

WATER

Install water purifying systems at schools, providing safe and clean drinking water to students.

SANITATION

Renovate or increase latrines, and install sanitation facilities such as washing station, soap and bins accordingly.

HYGIENE

Subsidize schools to launch hygiene classes to promote the use of toilets and cultivate students' hand washing habits.

For rural kids in developing countries, education is their way out of poverty. Yet, schools at remote areas are far away from the major routes, making the cost of reconstruction unbearable.

For the school rebuilding projects, we first conduct site visit and environmental assessment of the area, so as to design a school that best suits the local's needs.

Factors of consideration

- The school is located in the mountainous regions of a developing country
- The campus is old and dilapidated
- The school has the potential to offer advanced education to students

This year, we have confirmed 3 school rebuilding projects in Nepal and 1 in Myanmar, among which 2 campus have already been completed and put into use. Students are now receiving education at a better, safer and more comfortable environment.



Myanmar School Rebuilding Project Shaewgyi Village School

Location Nyaungshwe, Inle Lake, Myanmar

Number of beneficiaries 59

Located in the fishing village of Nyaungshwe, Shaewgyi Village School used to be a stilted campus above a river. The wooden piles were gradually decaying due to prolonged water soaking, with cracks found on walls and stairs.

To enhance the durability of campus, we decided to construct two campuses by concrete and bricks on the empty site near the original school.

Large Campus

The large campus consists of 4 classrooms with extra-large windows installed to ensure rooms are well lighted and ventilated.

Small Campus

The 2 classrooms at the small campus are used as staffroom and nursery.

Both campuses were completed in this August and put into service in September. With more classrooms, the school is actively considering to provide advanced education for students in the near future.



Nepal School Rebuilding Project Shree Ratna Secondary School

Location Manpang, Tanahu, Nepal Number of beneficiaries 170

After the disastrous earthquake in 2015, 1 of 3 premises of Shree Ratna Secondary School in Manpang, Nepal was destructed. With the walls, pillars and foundation severely damaged, it was decommissioned and students were forced to channel to the remaining 2 campuses for lessons. Remote as the school was, the reconstruction fee and transportation cost were too high for the locals.

We demolished the decommissioned premise and rebuilt it by cement and reinforcing steel. The new premise consists of 4 classrooms, and together with the existing premises, they can well suit the needs of 170 students. The project was completed in this September with all premises put into service after the grand opening ceremony in October.







Nepal School Rebuilding Project

Shree Kankalni Basic School

Location Dhading, Nepal Number of beneficiaries 180 Expected completion date 2019 June

Located at Dhading, Nepal, Shree Kankalni Basic School provides nursery to 5th grade education for students in the nearby villages. Post earthquake, one school premise collapsed – students were forced to huddle in a small temporary classroom built from steel roofing. Some students even needed to have lessons on the muddy area.

We will rebuild the collapsed premise and together with the existing premises, we are hopeful that the school can commence $6^{th}-8^{th}$ grade education courses for children in the future

Shree Prabha Basic School

Location Tanahun, Nepal Number of beneficiaries 135 Expected completion date 2019 June

Tanahun Shree Prabha Basic School provides nursery to 8th grade education for the locals, but 2 out of 5 premises were destroyed in the Nepal earthquake. Therefore, we decided to rebuild the destroyed premises and provide 5 classrooms in addition. With more vacancies, the school can consider to offer more advanced education in the future, bridging students to continue education at university.



Nutritious Meals in Cambodia

For sick children in rural villages of Cambodia, they must travel far to city hospitals for medical treatment. During recovery, their parents need to stay at the hospital and handle their kids' needs. Most of the hospitalized kids, however, suffer from malnutrition due to inadequate knowledge of parents on balanced diet preparation.

In partnership with Angkor Hospital for Children, we launched the Nutritious Meal Plan in Cambodia. With the following scopes covered, we ensure children can fully recover as soon as possible, and will not easily fall sick for the same reason in the future.

Medical Service

Basic health assessment is provided for all visiting kids. Once diagnosed with malnutrition, they receive treatments until full recovery. Post discharge from hospital, we fund hospital volunteers for subsequent home visits to keep track on their recovery progress.

Nutritious Meals

We sponsor the hospital to purchase nutritious food for hospitalized kids and their family members while teaching parents proper cooking method.

Health Talks

To ensure parents have sufficient knowledge on kid's health development, various health talks are offered. For example, parents are taught about the basic daily nutrients required for children to grow healthily.

Supplement Sponsorship

We give out free food and sanitation products, as well as transportation subsidy to eligible families.



Local Community Services



Behind the glamour of Hong Kong lies the widening wealth gap. With worsening inflation and aging population, the grassroots are bearing a heavy financial burden. During Chinese New Year and Mid-Autumn Festival, we organized the goodie bag distribution activity. Different sectors of the society can come together and visit the disadvantaged with bountiful goodie bags to pass on love and care.







In this Mid-Autumn Festival, we hoped to connect all spectrum of the society and brighten the season with warmth and laughter for the disadvantaged. During early September to the Mid-Autumn Festival, a series of goodie bag distribution activities were held at community centers, special schools and various public estates. Besides mooncakes and goodie bags, we also had interesting group games and heart-to-heart talks with 4,182 beneficiaries, sending our sincerest regards the seasonal across community.



We are very grateful to have received enthusiastic support from benefactors, who have been fundraising for us through various means in these 20 years. Most of the activities require participants to complete "missions impossible", to challenge oneself for the betterment of others.

Race for Water 2018 Make every sweat counts



Honorary consultants Mr. Richie Jen, Mr. Alex Fong and Ms. Stephy Tang joined our 15km race. "Race for Water 2018" was held successfully on 18th March 2018 at Pui Tak Canossian College. Besides 15 km and 30 km race, we added the challenging 42 km race in which participants had to walk up the famous Sky Ladder of the Hong Kong Trail.

Unlike other trail races, RFW posed advance physical and grit challenge to participants, who were required to carry 4.5L water on the back throughout the race. Tough as it was, the race offered the taste of hardship mountain villagers experience everyday to fetch water. With the staunch support of our racing heroes, HK\$3.32 million was raised for building water facilities in Mainland China, Cambodia and Nepal.

Held on 6th May at the Peak, this year's Walk for Water was rebranded as "AVEDA Walk & Run for Water 2018" with newly added running races to spice up the atmosphere. This age-friendly event aims to offer an authentic experience for participants on the hardship of residents living in arid areas, and hence raise funds for water facilities.

Participants can either join the relaxing Peak Circle Walk and enjoy the little games along the way, or compete with others in the Family or Youth Run. With the generous support of participants, we raised HK\$2.22 million in total for building water facilities in Mainland China, Cambodia and Nepal.



Flag Day 2018



In the Flag Day held in Hong Kong Island on 30th June, we are honored to have Siu Hak to help design a set of flags and special gold flags, which infused water element with Panda A Panda and Bitbit

The enthusiastic support of general public was unwavering despite the scotching sun. Together with the gold flag sale, the event raised over \$800,000 in total. Donations will be allocated to the provision of children and elderly welfare, rehabilitation and teenager services in Hong Kong; school rebuilding projects in Nepal and water projects in Mainland China, Cambodia and Nepal.



Charity Walkathon in Myanmar 2017 Explore the mysterious country



A Drop of Life paid a visit to Myanmar with 20 participants during Christmas, raising a total fund of \$178,328 for the school rebuilding project of Shaewgyi Village School.

Besides building large biosand filter, donations will also be used to renovate latrines, install sanitation facilities and provide hygiene classes, benefiting 2,200 students in total.

Charity Walkathon in Kazakhstan 2018

With the temperature dropping to -40°C in winter, students have to bear the horrendous chill to make their way to the dry toilet outdoor. The fund raised in this walkathon is

contributed to the construction of toilet and sanitation facilities inside the campus we visited during the trip, as well as the implementation of water purifying system at 5 hospitals in Nepal.

Charity Walkathon hopes to impact life by life, to transform beneficiaries' lives while sparking positive vibe and inspiration among participants to walk together for bettering beneficiaries lives.

Every drop of clean water we city people enjoy is a precious gift for residents in remote areas. Bonaqua® has provided high quality mineral water in Hong Kong for many years, and devotes itself in improving water quality for the countries in need.





2019 Prospects

In face of challenges Remember our original aspiration

In the last 20 years, A Drop of Life has made every effort on developing our water projects. The water facilities we built not only made water more accessible, but also increased crop yield and bettered the chance for kids to go to school, bringing a long-term change to the society. Water resources deficit is a global challenge - in recent years, we visited different countries to have more insight on the matter, just to realize the problem is far more complex than imagined.

Passing on the hopes of water to Africa

This year, we have paid a site-visiting trip to Ethiopia. Affected by the serious drought, children were malnourished while residents had to walk for 10km daily for water. In the future, we will expand our water projects and nutritious meal plan to

Ethiopia, in hopes that it can relieve the situation. Meanwhile, we will launch WASH Programme at school, to cultivate the good hygiene practices for the next generation and help them understand the importance of conserving water source. Despite numerous challenges we face on the implementation of water projects in a new country, we uphold the belief that everyone deserves clean drinking water.

Enhancement on fundraising efficiency

In order to utilize donations received, we strive to minimize administration cost. In the coming year, we will use rental income and donations from private donors to cover the necessary operating expenses – the amount public donations allocated to each charity projects can hence be maximized.
